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discoveries is finding your God-ordained purpose. Purpose propels you to attempt things you would never do otherwise. Understanding your purpose is especially important if you are striving to fulfill your calling and ministry in the Kingdom of God. There is nothing more rewarding in life than to know God has called and anointed you to achieve a specific purpose or mission. To effectively achieve that purpose, however, requires more than head knowledge or desire. It is not enough to just believe you have been called. You must realize that with that calling comes a mandate from God to fulfill it. No one understood this truth more than Paul the apostle. From a prison cell in Rome, he wrote to Philemon and named several key people associated with the church in his house. Unlike the others who he referred to simply as a "fellow labourer" (Philemon and Appia who was probably Philemon's wife), he specifically greeted Archippus, but described him as a "fellow soldier."

"And to our beloved Apphia, and Archippus our fellow soldier, and to the church in thy house:" (Philemon 1:2)

There is no way to know for sure why Paul distinguished Archippus as he did in this way. I personally believe it was directly related to the level of ministry and purpose Archippus was called to that Paul was aware of. Paul also sent a message to Archippus in his letter

ne of life's most important to the Colossian church. This time, discoveries is finding your God-ordained purpose. Purpose propels you to the Colossian church. This time, however, he gave a very direct message reminding him to fulfill the ministry that he was given from the Lord.

"And say to Archippus, Take heed to the ministry which thou hast received in the Lord, that thou fulfill it." (Colossians, 4:17)

When a very special word from God is experienced, and divine purpose is realized, there will most often come with it a dichotomy of emotions. On one hand there is a strong sense of urgency to act and do what you know God has called you to do. On the other hand, there is often an overwhelming feeling of inadequacy and unworthiness. Both emotions are very real and must be dealt with. There is no reason to allow the latter emotion to hinder or limit God's purpose and calling. Instead, it should serve as a launching point for preparation. The path to preparation is not always the same for everyone.

The need for preparation is the same, however, and must not be compromised. If God has called you, HE will also enable and equip you to fulfill your purpose. Much like Archippus, God totally expects us to fulfill the ministry and the mission He has called us to. No one knows exactly what his or her mission and purpose will be in detail when the assignment from God is first received. It will always appear impossible. Why is that? Because on our own, it is impossible. Every God-ordained purpose will require themiraculous to bring it to

pass. What we do know is, just as God expected Archippus to fulfill his purpose, He also expects us to fulfill ours. A true God-ordained vision that reveals God's purpose for your life will always be bigger than your ability to achieve it alone. Don't be shocked! When purpose is revealed, your faith will bechallenged to its limits! That doesn't remove the fact that each of us have a purpose and ministry that God expects us to fulfill.

With purpose, there must also be understanding. If you do not understand your purpose it is very unlikely that you will ever have the endurance and perseverance to follow through until the end. In the Kingdom of God, people rarely (if ever) do something with passion, without first understanding the purpose and how it relates to God's eternal plan. Apathy and complacency are the byproduct of a lack of proper understanding with regards to purpose. Show me anyone that doesn't understand their purpose for life and ministry, and I'll show you someone who is apathetic and will not strive to do anything with excellence. Do you know where you fit in God's eternal plan? Do you know what has God called you to fulfill and why? Most often, those who truly know and understand their purpose make lifelong learning a priority. This is because in the kingdom of God divine purpose is the reason for everything we do or strive to become.





instructors seek to further develop disciples who utilize their God given gifts to develop other disciples through evangelism (represented by baptism), and "teaching them to observe all things whatsoever [Jesus] commanded" (Matthew 28:19). Recent curriculum updates provided focused objectives for every lesson to develop both foundational and advanced students. Now PI wants to help instructors teach more effectively.

To date PI has conducted "Training the Trainer" events in several locations. Each year's PI Summit in Dallas, Texas, includes some instructor training elements. Some of these have included teaching toward objectives, improving field experience effectiveness and specific content areas such as biblical hermeneutics. Summit training comes from global staff members as well as other nationally known teachers such as UPCI General Superintendent David K. Bernard and Professor David Norris from Urshan Graduate School of Theology. In the 2016 Summit deans and administrators received focused training; the 2017 Summit is open for all PI instructors who are able to make the trip.

PI also conducts "Training the Trainer" seminars in strategic locations. In 2015, PI held a pan-Asian seminar in Kuala Lumpur, Malaysia. The initial goal to have 100 attendees was eclipsed by the 150 who came from all over Asia. The life changing sessions provided training in key areas as well

as spiritual impartation for all those in attendance. Missionaries David Doan and Ray Clevenger invited the PI academic director to conduct training in Fukuoka and Okinawa, Japan, in May and June of 2016. Missionary Doan plans to host additional training


seminars in the future. Similar training took place in Montreal, Canada, with Scott and Liane Grant in July 2016 for both English and French speaking instructors. PI looks forward to planning more regional and district "Training the Trainer" seminars over the next few years. PI will also make web based instructor training available in 2017 for those who cannot attend national or regional training seminars.

"Training the Trainer" seminars cover a wide range of topics. Building on the right foundation of the Church' s call to be God's mission in the world, instructors foster a deeper appreciation for the relationship between instructor, student and the church community's roles in leadership development. Instructors also learn teaching and mentoring principles that assist them in shifting to a learner-

centered approach to their work. Some sessions specifically address the value of reflection and service in learning. Finally, instructors explore strategies for assessing their students' achievement of course objectives. District and regional seminars frequently include additional topics based on the needs of that area.

PI sincerely believes its "Training the Trainer" seminars serve a critical role in sending laborers into the field. PI instructors gain from clarified perspective of their role, develop teaching tools, and receive spiritual impartation. Instructors fellowship develop support systems with other instructors; many instructors currently lack this broader support network needed to increase educational effectiveness. PI campuses become more effective through refined efforts of instructors. Students benefit from learner focused instruction presented by energized instructors. Other ministries in the church benefit from transferable lessons learned. would suggest that most pastors, myself first of all, have typically been too easy-going on the members of our congregations when it comes to ascribing them to the responsibility of making disciples. In what emotion or tradition might our reluctance perhaps be rooted? Have we unwittingly perpetuated a myth that only people that possess certain personality-types, skill sets or the gift of evangelism are the ones capable of making disciples? If so, this is not only untrue but is also one of the reasons that we have not had a greater impact on our communities and the world.

The bar of expectations has been set far too low in the area of making disciples. Our problem is two fold: Who do we qualify to make disciples and what expectations do we place on our new believers once they become born again? We must be willing to admit that for too long our goal (albeit subconsciously) has been to get people saved, paying their tithes, and coming

to church three times a week. This sure, but none of them are organic (i.e. profile of a twenty-first century believer is much different than that of a first century disciple. Every pastor would do well to contemplate their hesitation, if not reluctance, to place the same expectations on their congregation that Jesus did on his first century followers.

long hard look at how we are doing the business of the Great Commission. If perhaps we have not yet caught the method of the mission prescribed by the Founder then it follows that we have not challenged or equipped our congregations to go make disciples (as an organic daily discipline). As a limited substitute we have employed every motivational mechanism imaginable in an attempt to engage our saints in reaching lost people. Things like door knocking, street services, block parties, mass mailings, special event days, etc. Are these the things Jesus has in mind when he said, "Go make disciples"? All of these efforts have netted results to be lives. I have found that most of the

It is possible some have stooped so low as to employ tactics such as guilt, fear, intimidation, and even manipulation in their desperate attempt to engage I'm suggesting that we should take a faithful church members in the harvest. saints I lead will want to live up to the pastors are sometimes hesitant to teach expectations that I place upon them as their pastor, not to mention what they would want to do for Christ. Pastors communicate their expectations to the members of their assembly by how they preach to them, how they speak with them personally, and by the behavior that they model before them. If the expectation is for saints to just come to church, sing in the choir, come to prayer meeting, and give in the offering (or not), then that is exactly what pastors will get. However if the expectation is that they will go and make a disciple this year I believe that most of them will respond positively.

Jesus didn't just preach great messages and teach profound truths to his disciples on Sundays and Wednesdays. His goal was not to be popular or for them to like him. He was not satisfied by drawing a big crowd, working a few miracles, feeding them, and sending them home with warm feelings in their heart. He placed a demand on his twelve volunteers to reproduce the very same disciple-making behavior he had acted out with them.



But unlike some leaders attempting to get a new company or a new business or venture off the ground, Jesus did not use bait and switch tactics. He did not offer special discounts for those who responded first or extra perks for ground level applicants. He did not sneak up on people and try to soft sell his vision. He used straight talk. One thing I've always appreciated about the way Jesus communicated was that he personally modeled commitment before he preached commitment or asked for commitment.

So how do we know if we qualify to be a disciple of Jesus Christ today? I think this question can be answered with one simple question: Who is your disciple? Believers who have their hands daily on sinners and friends in an attempt to make disciples out of them qualify for being a disciple of Jesus Christ. Anyone who is daily living out their life intentionally with others in mind, and is building relationships with lost people, and who has denied themselves, taken up their cross, lost their life and demonstrated that they are willing to forsake all to follow in his footsteps, has achieved the Biblical distinction of a twenty-first century disciple of Jesus Christ. Pastor, let's go make disciples who make disciples.

hat role should education play in the people (II Chronicles 17:7-10). Apostolic movement? We live in an age of training are beneficial or even necessary for certain careers. Moreover, in an increasingly diverse and complex society, it is helpful for people to obtain a variety of learning experiences that can enrich their lives and prepare them for future opportunities and challenges. At the same time, secular education can undermine people's belief in the Bible.

What role should education play in the preparation of believers for Christian service—as pastors, teachers, and lay leaders? On the one hand, a Bible-based education can provide helpful tools for ministry. On the other hand, we cannot accomplish effective ministry simply by acquiring human knowledge and ability; we must have the power of the Holy Spirit.

The answer is that we need a variety of educational opportunities and experiences in the kingdom of God, but our supreme resources for Christian life and ministry must be the Word of God and the Spirit of God. All ministers and lay leaders need biblically based training to be more effective in their work for God. Scripture admonishes spiritual workers, "Be diligent to present yourself approved to God as a workman who does not need to be ashamed, accurately handling the word of truth" (II Timothy 2:15, NASB).

God uses ministers in different ways, according to His purpose, including those with little education and those with great education. The Galilean apostles were considered "ignorant and unlearned" by the religious elite in Jerusalem (Acts 4:13), yet they powerfully established the New Testament church upon the rock of Christ Jesus. At the same time, the apostle Paul had the ancient equivalent of a graduate degree in theology, and God used him mightily to establish churches among the Gentiles, write Scripture, and preach before governors and kings.

Whether people obtain a formal education or not, the Bible encourages the pursuit of spiritual training and scriptural study. In the Old Testament, prophets gathered in companies, assemblies, or schools to study the Word of God. Samuel headed one such school of the prophets (I Samuel 19:20). Elijah was closely associated with these students (II Kings 4:38-44; 6:1-7). King Jehoshaphat kindled revival throughout the country of Judah by sending princes, priests, and Levites into all the cities to teach God's Word to the experience great apostolic revival.

specialization in which various forms of In the New Testament, Jesus trained His twelve apostles intensively during his three-year ministry, using the Old Testament as His text. Paul studied under the great Jewish scholar Gamaliel and then spent three years of concentrated spiritual contemplation in Arabia (Acts 22:3; Galatians 1:17-18). He taught the Word of God for two years at a school in Ephesus (Acts 19:9-10).

> Pastors and leaders are responsible for developing those under their care. As a church grows, itneeds a team of leaders to fulfill the ministries of the church. Moreover, much like secular professionals, spiritual leaders need continuing education. The Word of God is so profound that we can spend a lifetime plumbing its depths. How can pastors train leaders effectively, and how can ministers, leaders, and workers in the local church get training? To address this need, the United Pentecostal Church International has established or endorsed a number of institutions of higher learning and ministry training, including Purpose Institute. These institutions deliver instruction through on-campus teaching, distance learning, and in the case of Purpose Institute, local churches. For many church workers, training provided in the local area is the most practical and effective.

An apostolic education enables people to prepare more fully for service in God's kingdom and ultimately to fulfill the ministry God has given them. urpose institute has been a gift from God for me. Purpose Institute was the catalyst in the motivation of changing my life for the better. It has also birthed change in the lives of many people that never knew God.

I attended Texas Bible College from 1975 to 1978. During that time I had some of the very best teachers, chosen men of God. Men like J.R. Ensey and E. L Holley. Now I am equally blessed to have three powerful men of God with Purpose Institute: my Pastor Dannie Hood, Pastor Kevin Shaw, and Pastor Larry Pollard. I have learned so much with Purpose Institute and have had many good things refreshed in my life as a result.

The reason I first enrolled in Purpose Institute was because my wife wanted more Biblical knowledge. We are starting our fourth and final semester year this fall. Not only has the assigned work helped me learn more about the Bible and ministry, but I have also been able to share the required country.

Purpose Institute has had an eternal effect, not only upon me, but numerous others. About three years ago Pastor Hood called people to the front of our church that would give sacrificially to the outreach of soul winning. I have always been a soul winner. When Pastor Hood requested people come to the front of the church, I did not go to the front that day as I was not ready to make the commitment that I knew it required. I finally said "Ok, I will go to Purpose Institute with my wife to appease God," as if that would make Him happy with my sacrifice -not a chance!

Once I got into the powerful material that Purpose Institute provides, that was it. The fires of past soul winning took hold of me once again. I knew to whom much is given, much is required! 'n 2006, God began to deal with my wife and I about planting a church in Millersburg, Ohio. Three years later we began that church. I spent the next several years trying desperately to get what help I could. I leaned heavily upon my pastor, Bro. Ed Nichols, and several other men – one of which was Bishop F. Joe Ellis who kept encouraging me to enroll in Purpose Institute. I can honestly say that my original thought was, "I have already been through Bible College and I don't have time What I realized very quickly was PI is not just to spend taking classes I have already been through." But as time passed I realized how It is not just a place to receive knowledge, it unprepared I was when I started the church. I became so desperate that I finally made the time and started PI in the Spring Semester of God can speak into your life and your spirit 2012.

After the first weekend of classes I realized just how different PI was. I left not only with increased knowledge, but encouraged that I could do what God had called me to do. Over the last fours years I cannot tell the number

of times that God has spoken to me directly through the messages and classes I have sat through. My wife knew that on those Saturdays when I would be driving home the classes and the way God had moved and answered a direct prayer I had prayed just

There was another unexpected benefit of PI. I grew to love during my time as a student. Fellowship during the classes opened doors for new relationships. Nothing seems to bring us so close to one another as the study of the Word of God. I covet those relationships as much as any gift God has given me.

It would not be a small thing for me to say that PI has been vital in my ability to develop as a pastor and grow in my walk with God. about education, it is about life application. is that and much more. What I learned over those four years is that PI is a setting where and perform those things that will forever change you. If you want to grow in your walk with God, develop inspiring relationships, and have the knowledge to succeed in the kingdom, Purpose Institute is the perfect place for you.

# WITH SCOTT & LIANE GRANT

The following is an interview from a campus piloting the PI Field Experience Project.

PI FIELD EXPERIENCE PILOT PROJECT - MONTREAL - FALL 2015 Q & A with Campus Dean (Scott Grant) and Campus Administrator (Liane Grant)

#### Q. Tell us how you chose the students for the Field Experience Pilot Project in Montreal.

A. Eight students expressed interest in participating. Out of these, we chose three foundational students (in their 3rd semester) and one advanced student (7th semester). Since our campus is very multicultural, the countries represented were Canada, Madagascar, Belgium and the Philippines. Two of the students were male and two were female; all were from different local churches. Two were French and two were English. We wanted to have a good cross-section represented in the pilot project in terms of gender, culture and language.

#### Q. What types of field experience were the students involved in?

A. Among the four students, there was a wide variety of field experience involved. They all did local church placements, as the first phase of the pilot project did not include community experience. One student organized prayer groups for the Malagasy community in Montreal's South Shore. Another was mentored by his pastor in pulpit ministry. One student's pastor involved her in various ministry activities including teaching Home Bible studies and speaking in midweek service. The last student coordinated outreach activities and visitor follow-up for our new church plant in Quebec City.

#### Q.What was the students' overall response to the pilot project?

A. All of the students involved in the pilot project said that while they were unsure at the beginning of how it would work out, they learned a lot about God, themselves and other people through the process. They felt that the experience was invaluable in helping them to grow in ministry and learn to depend on God.

Q. How did the students enjoy working closely with a mentor?

A. Every one of them said that the mentoring relationship was extremely beneficial. They watched their pastor skillfully handle situations with people, when they were not sure themselves how to react. They discovered how important it is to be gentle and patient with people when ministering to them. One student's mentor was the care group director of

the local church, and she was very helpful in giving advice, direction and encouragement. All of the students said their mentor pushed them out of their comfort zone, which they appreciated later, since it helped them to develop much needed skills.

#### Q. Were there any negative comments about the pilot project?

A. Each of the students was a little confused at first about the process and paperwork, because it was so different from the previous system of just entering information online about experience credits. They gave some great suggestions for streamlining the process. However, all of them agreed that the new system is much more intentional and effective, allowing them to target specific ministry areas and work side by side with a mentor to develop skills in those areas.

#### Q. Are there any student testimonies you would like to share from the pilot project?

A. One student's testimony was very impacting: how she learned that knowledge and preparation are not enough. She was under the impression that if she studied and prepared diligently, her ministry activity would turn out fine. But she discovered that if she did not invest time in prayer beforehand, it sometimes became a disaster. She realized that while preparation is crucial, so is depending completely on God for His blessing on our ministry activity. The anointing that comes through prayer makes all the difference.

#### Q. Do you have any advice for other campuses and students regarding field experience?

A. The personal connection of a mentor is so important. Students often need a nudge (or a push) to launch into a new experience, but they also need to know that someone is praying for them, and they need encouragement and good advice. The student working in the new church plant in Quebec City was the only apostolic living on site at the time, and at first she thought she had to wait until we (the pastor and his wife) could visit in order for things to happen. But she realized that God wanted to use her to touch people in Quebec City on a daily basis, since she is the one who lives there. She started reaching out to the people in her neighbourhood and at her job, and recently there were 10 visitors in service as a result of her efforts. Seeing how God will use whoever makes themselves available has helped her to step out in confidence that He will reward prayer and effort.







